





## Santa Barbara Model A Ford Club Monthly Meeting Minutes October 4, 2023

The meeting was opened by the President, Janet Cox, at 7:10 pm. After the Pledge of Allegiance (and a bit of technology folderol), Janet introduced our special guest, Sherry Winkinhofer, the "Focus on Fashion" editor of the Restorer. Program: Working from her home in Missouri with a new video system, Sherry showed us part of her collection of "Era Fashion" items, including purses, hats, jewelry, dresses, coats, and more. She explained all the items as she showed them; more information about her collection and the research she does on Era Fashion can be found in The Restorer, usually on page 38. Fred Duerner reported that the AACA sponsored a very successful parade of 100 old/classic cars along Rt 246 in Solvang visiting neighborhoods, schools, and retirement homes. The most outstanding part of the parade was that the cars all followed a Batmobile. John Haggerty won for his car at the Woody Show, held on the last Saturday in July.

New Business: Fred also reported that the Fiddlers' Convention, sponsored by the Goleta Valley Historical Society, will be held at Stow House 0n Oct 7-8. The Club now has a Facebook site. Check it out! "Santa Barbara Model A Ford Club" is the name of our site. Peter Georgi reported that the Bishop Diego Car Week show was very successful, and he asked that the Club consider joining it next year. The Goleta Holiday Parade will be held on December 2nd. If you are going to enter the parade, you must show proof of insurance. The Central Coast BBQ will be held at the Humann estate in Orcutt on Oct 21st. Tickets are \$5 ahead of time, and \$10 at the door. The Club's Holiday Dinner will be held at Mulligan's on December 3rd. The Club will pay for dessert, so the final cost is \$42 per person. The Lunner will be held on November 18th, starting at Janet's and ending at Fred's. Jack and Steve have the middle 2 courses. It's always good food! And free!

Car Projects: There was some report about a clutch arm shaft and cast iron brake drums, and what




Steve Penniman won the Name Draw, but he was in New Zealand. Pity.



## STARTING A MODEL A

Starting a Model Model A Ford isn't as simple as in a modern automobile and can be a struggle for a novice. This procedure will help the novice. One must recognize that there were variations in even original Model A Fords. For example, the gas shut off valve was moved from under the dash to under the hood in 1931.



## STARTING PROCEDURE

- Engage emergency brake by pulling back on it.
- 2. Push lever left of steering wheel (Spark Control) all the way up (Retard)
- 3. Pull lever right of the steering (Hand Throttle) half way down
- 4. Turn Gas Valve under dash on passenger side to open (Pointing down)
- 5. Turn Choke Control Valve (under right side of dash) full clockwise and back off 1/4 turn. If it's quite cold out, it may be better to open a full turn.
- 6. Turn Ignition Switch on (Clockwise)
- 7. Push in clutch and put Transmission in Neutral
- 8. Pull Choke Control Out
- 9. Turn engine over 3 Revolutions Choke in on 3rd Revolution
- 10. When Engine Starts Push Throttle Lever (Right Lever) Up
- 11. Put Left Lever all the way down.

  (Depending on how your engine is timed, 3/4 down might be better.)
- 12. Allow Engine to Warm Up. (The accelerator pedal will need to be used to keep engine running until it warms up.)
- 13. Turn Choke control (actually GAV) clockwise to smoothest operating condition.
- 14. When starting an engine, which is already warmed up, omit Choke steps.
- 15. Always put Left Lever (Spark Retard Position) all the way up when starting & then down when driving.
- 16. Have Fun Driving!





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

## Model A Club At Beach Today

The July meeting of the Santa Barbara chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America will be a beach party at Goleta Beach Park today at 1 p.m.

Gary Lees, a fellow member from Washington, will be a guest. His restored 1928 Phaeton will be of interest to many.

This article above appeared in last month's Mohair Flyer. Our member Karen Haugse noticed it because Gary and Gerrie Lees have since moved from Seattle to Santa Maria and are now members of the Santa Maria A's and showed it to them.

This brought back a flood of memories for Gary and Gerrie. It prompted them to write this story to the right of how they happened to join the Santa Barbara Model A Club for a picnic at the beach on their return trip to Seattle in July of 1961.

## A Model A Trip from Seattle to Los Angeles —by Gary and Gerrie Lees

In 1961 we drove our 1928 Phaeton from Seattle to Los Angeles. Thinking it was unusual for such a long trip in an old car, the Seattle Times came out to our house to take pictures and printed an article for the newsletter.

We kept the following log on the way down, but not on the way home because of buying a '29 station wagon in Glendale, CA, details later.

Day 1: Left Seattle at 6:50 pm after work. Car was overheating just after entering old 99 freeway in Tacoma. The 15 was not built yet. Stopped to remove the small screen over the radiator. Still running hot, so we removed the large bug screen and license plate. Refueled in Olympia (about 60 miles from home) and arrived in Portland, Oregon at 10:45 pm.

Day 2: Left Portland at 8 am. Weather was cold so we put on the rear side curtains. Stopped in Roseburg for lunch, weather warmed up so removed the side curtains and our coats. On to Weed for dinner (6 pm) and arrived in Redding at 8:45 pm. Traveled 450 miles in approx. 11 hours.

Day 3: Left Redding at 7 am, arrived in Sacramento at 11. Car running fine except for overheating. Added water about every hour. Stopped at a gas station to change head gasket and advanced the timing. Seems to run a little cool-

er. Called the Capital A Club in Sacramento and met Jim Hickey and the Gustafson's – they called several other members, and we had lunch together. Left there at 3 pm and arrived in Fresno at 7:30 pm where we stayed overnight.

Day 4: Left Fresno at 6 am, trying to beat the heat. No trouble this last leg of the trip except reaching the boiling point over the Grapevine. Arrived in Glendale at noon where we stayed with an old college friend.

Through the Model A Club in Glendale we heard about a 29 Woody Station Wagon for sale. Bought the unrestored Model A for \$300. After visiting with friends, including a picnic at the beach with the Model A Club it was time to head home. Left Glendale with Gary driving the station wagon and Gerrie driving the touring car for the first time after a quick driving lesson around the block Ran into a short rainstorm- the first time using the novelty of a hand operated wind-

shield wiper on the touring car. The wagon had no windshield wiper and a leaky top so Gary got a little wet. Had a flat tire on the wagon (all the tires were bald), but we made it home with no other trouble. We drove back home on the 101 through Santa Barbara, meeting with the A club for a picnic at the beach. Then switched over to old 99 for the remainder of the trip. It



was a tiring trip with no one to talk to, no radio or cell phone, just the drone of the Model A motor. Quite an adventure we would not try again! Leave such an adventure for the younger generation. After getting home we found out the touring car had a cracked block —no wonder we overheated and had to keep adding water.

Kept track of expenses on the way down only: Traveled 1,147 miles, using 56 gallons of gas and 30 quarts of oil.

Food	\$14.50
Total	\$55.36
