



#### TECHNICAL TALK: with Arlyn Bieber

#### A Tool For All Seasons - By Tom Endy 2023

When it comes time to tighten the rear axle nuts on a Model A that hold the brake drums on there is a need for a torque wrench. The torque value is plus or minus a nominal 100 ft. lbs. My technique is to set the torque wrench at 90 ft. lbs. and tighten the nut, then see where the cotter pin hole is. If it is dead on I leave it. If it is not, I tighten the nut more until the hole is visible. Sounds simple enough, but there is a problem. In order to gain access to the nut the wheel must be removed. This requires that the rear of the car must be sitting on jack stands. When you apply that much torque to the nut the brake drum wants to rotate. Even with a helper push-



ing on the brake pedal it may not be enough. The BLT Guys run into this problem every time they install a Mitchell overdrive. During the install process the two axle nuts have to be removed so that thread protectors can be installed on the ends of the axle shafts and the removed rear end dropped into a cradle with the axle ends supported by the cradle. This necessitates that both axle nuts be re-torqued before the wheels are put back on. To simplify the job Bryan Thompson developed a unique tool that holds the drum from rotating. The tool can also be used anytime the axle nuts need to be torqued, such as when doing brake job, or when just checking the torque on the nut. A torque wrench is shown positioned on the rear axle nut to tighten it. The tool is shown positioned on a rear brake drum.



The tool is shown here (left). It is mounted on the brake drum so that three lug bolts on the brake drum are inserted into the three tubes on the tool. The pipe is then extended down through the tool to rest on the ground to prevent the drum from turning as the axle nut is being torqued.

#### THE MAFFI MINUTE

The Gilmore Auto Museum, the site of the Model A Museum, is open year round. And, if you click the Media button, you can hear the audio recordings of original records developed in the Model A Era for salesmen's use in training and customer sales. They're fun to listen to! If you're more of a visual person, there's a MAFFI You Tube site, also accessible from the website as well as Paul Shinn, the Model A Guy's You Tube site, accessible from the website.

And, as a bit of fun trivia let me leave you with this tidbit. One hundred and ten years ago, on Jan. 5, 1914, Henry Ford implemented a \$5 per day wage for his workers. But, workers soon found out they wouldn't immediately get the \$5 per day. Workers still made \$2.30 and were given a \$2.70 bonus if they followed all of the company's requirements. Here's how workers would be eligible: \* abstain from alcohol,\* not physically abusive toward their families, \*not take in boarders, \*keep homes clean, \*contribute to a savings account. A few of those requirements wouldn't be a bad deal today to require, would they!! #### Old Borego...The Historic Heart of the Borrego Valley by Phil Brigandi

The first homesteaders began to arrive in the Borrego Valley around 1910. The valley was isolated, hemmed in by rugged mountains on three sides. Going to town for supplies meant at least a five-day round-trip to Brawley, or the long climb up Grapevine Canyon and on to Ramona. But slowly, a little community began to develop. In the mid-1920s a road was opened up through Sentenac Canyon, and the Ensign family put down the first deep well in the valley, attracting more settlers to the area.

1928 was a banner year for the Borrego Valley. The first public school opened in the valley; a local voting precinct was established; the first chamber of commerce, the Borego Boosters Club, was formed; San Diego County assigned a deputy sheriff to the area; and on March 1, 1928 the Borego Post Office was created. ("Borego" -- with just one "r" -- was how the old timers always spelled the name.)

The first postmaster was Eslie Wynn, an Azusa jeweler who had taken up a homestead in the southeastern part of the valley around 1918. The original Borego post office was located in his home. Wynn's place was close to where the old roads past Borrego and Barrel springs met the road over the hills from the Narrows that connected with the new Sentenac Canyon route (which later became Hwy. 78). With the post office there, Wynn's homestead became a natural meeting place for the residents of the valley. This was the start of Old Borego.

Wynn was quick to take advantage of the increased traffic. Before the year was out, he installed a gas pump in front of his home, and opened the first gas station in the valley. In the spring of 1929, Wynn had a new building built opposite his home, and moved the post office across the way. That September, he opened the valley's first store in the new building. His clerk was homesteader Herbert LaNiece. The county also established a branch library in the store building, and Mrs. LaNiece agreed to serve as librarian. Later, around 1935, a separate little library building was built north of the store.

The mail for Borego came down from Julian two days a week, and local residents could pick up their letters at Wynn's post office. Henry Nelson, was the first to drive the mail, and also carried passengers and freight. Milo Porter, who homesteaded near the mouth of Henderson Canyon in 1927, hauled the mail from October, 1928 to June, 1930. "He got \$60 a month," his widow, Lelah recalled, "and furnished his own transportation and his own gasoline."

Old Borego has long since passed into other hands, but fortunately many of the historic buildings there have been preserved by her current owners. The stone portion of Eslie Wynn's original home and post office is the oldest surviving building in the valley, and DuVall's Borego Store was a local landmark for decades. Although it is no longer the center of the community, Old Borego remains the historic heart of the Borrego Valley -- a reminder of the pioneer heritage that forms the foundation for modern Borrego Springs.


#### **CONDOLENCES**






