

Our picnic table was set up in the driveway and flanked by 3 Model A's. John G. decorated the table with Model a Parts so the ladies can learn.




Six Model A instructors showed up for the Ladies Picnic. They each earned a point towards the 2024 Eric Salter Award.



HISTORY OF MY 1930 MODEL A FORD By Don Lauer

My car was assembled in 1930 at the Ford plant in San Francisco, Calif. (see SFA 8000 stamped on top of the front body cross member).

In January 1930, Model A Engine Serial Numbers were 2742696 through 2826649 (see the publication "Model A Ford VIN numbers").

The Model A Engine Serial Number (today's VIN) on my car is 2812961 (stamped on the left side of the engine block) indicating the engine was manufactured in Michigan in January 1930 and subsequently shipped to the San Francisco assembly plant.

I'm under the assumption my car was purchased new in 1930 by a family in San Jose Calif. (can't be verified) and registered with the Calif. DMV.

My car was sold about 20 years later (early 1950's) by the San Jose family to Mr. Charles Clark ("Model A Charlie") in Richmond, Calif. and was registered by Mr. Clark with the Calif. DMV (as later explained to me by Mr. Clark). Mr. Clark completed a few repairs to the car and re-painted it (light blue with yellow wheels). Model A Charlie was a great source for car parts.

In about 1954, Mr. Clark sold my car to Mr. William Claussen in El Cerrito, Calif. who registered it with the Calif. DMV (verified by my conversations, as a teenager, with Mr. Clark and Mr. Claussen).

In August 1957, while still in high school I purchased Mr. Claussen's car for \$75.00 and I registered it with the Calif. DMV (Calif. license plate EJY379).

I drove the car for the next 10 years while in high school, college undergraduate school and college

graduate school. Note: In October 1962, I met on a blind date my future wife, Carol, in my Model A... we got married in August 1964.

In 1979, I completely dismantled my car (every nut and bolt!)

In 1967, I stopped driving the car and put it into a friend's garage for storage. In 1974, I moved the car from California to Sioux Falls, South Dakota and registered it with the South Dakota DMV using VIN

2812961. I did not license the car in South Dakota because it was not operable.

In 1979, I completely dismantled my car (every nut and bolt!) in my garage and began a long-term "frame up" restoration. I had the



engine rebuilt by a local expert engine mechanic (Mr. Ole Garvick). I

loaded the car's frame on top of our station wagon and Carol took it to a sand blasting shop...after 26 years and countless hours of hard work in my garage, I never finished the "amateur" job that I was doing.

In 2005, I engaged an experienced mechanic in South Dakota (Mr. Les Iseminger) to finish my amateur restoration effort...after 11 years (and about 950 hours!) of his "off and on" work on my car, it was reassembled and painted to the original colors. It still was not finished!

In September 2016, I had my unfinished restored car (that was still not operable) shipped from South



Dakota to Santa Barbara, California.

I engaged an experienced member of the Santa Barbara Model A Club (Mr. Ron Ryker in Goleta, Calif.) to finish the full restoration of my car, and after 100 hours of effort...he finished it! On March 1, 2017, my car became fully operable (38 years after I started myrestoration project) and was registered and licensed in California using VIN 2812961. Later that year, I joined the Santa Barbara Model A Club.

Santa Barbara Model A Ford Club Monthly Meeting Minutes January 3, 2024

The meeting was opened by the President, Janet Cox, at 7:20 pm. After the Pledge of Allegiance, Janet introduced Randy Douglas, who introduced his granddaughter, Kate, who told us about Providence High school's fundraising concert on January 19th at the Arlington. They would like to have some Model As to drive VIP guests



to the concert, which will benefit the local charity called Kids Helping Kids. Also present was their teacher, Jamie deVrien.Bob Carty also introduced his guests, David and Lisa Carty, from Riverside. David is an avid car restorer, and has a keen interest in the Carty family history.

Program: Susan Carty, speaker, introduced herself with a brief sketch, and then told the group about the road trips she and Bob have taken, which led to her interest in maps, and especially the history of roads and highways in the US. She described the history of the Interstate System, and how they are numbered from West to East starting with i5 from San Diego to Canada, and ending with i95 from Maine to Miami. From South to North, the Interstate highways are numbered from i10 from Santa Monica to Jacksonville, FL and ending with i90 from Seattle to Boston. Three-digit numbers on the Interstate system are a little different. The last 2 digits correspond to the "parent" highway they are linked to. If the first digit is even, the route goes through or around a city, and is connected at both ends. If the first number is odd, the route goes into a city, and is only connected to its parent Interstate at one end. Susan's handout, which she forgot to copy for the group, is now available on the Club's website.

Following the highways portion of her talk, Susan introduced their travel mascot and companion, a skinny colorful chicken named Henrietta. Meeting people and striking up conversations is Henrietta's major skill in life and her exploits have been recorded in a picture book. Autographed copies are not yet available to the public.

Secretary's Report: There was no report for December.

Treasurer's Report: The treasurer, Bob Davis, reported a balance in the savings account of \$6067.53. \$920 was deposited in the account in December, and there were expenses of \$1034.50 for that month.

Old Business: The Rubber Chicken Award was presented to Fred Duerner because he cut his leg in a parade and bled all over his car. The gymkhana will be held in May at Fred's place Hopefully, he will no longer be bleeding at that time.

MODEL A MECHANICAL

At the January Ladies Picnic we learned where these parts of the wiring were located:

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


Fig. 18A. Wiring diagram showing the internal circuits of the model A Ford cars not equipped with cowl lamps, with two hulls in each bondlame.

When starting to trace one of the several electrical circuits, begin with the positive (+) terminal of the buttery or generatur. The buttery is the assures of supply when the engine is not running, or generator is running very startly. When the generator speed is incremed to the point where its valtage becomes greater than the buttery voltage, the relay points alone and then the generator is the source of electrical current supply and also charges the buttery. See DyAc's Automobile Encycloperila, pages 332, 448 and 427 explaining the principle of operation of the current cut-out (relay), how to trace circuits, etc.

Q. Can you identify what these are & what Model A Year?

A. These are called Radiator Shells. The one on the left is a 28-29 with the bottom more flat. Notice that it is also painted which indicates it originally on a truck. The two on the right are more rounded on the bottom. They were designed that way for the 30-31 Model A Ford.

This one is a 28 or 29 Roadster. Possibly with 35 Ford wheels (the tires look wider than stock 21").



A 30 or 31 Tudor (can't see the splash apron above the running board to tell if it's a one piece or 2 piece.)



A 30 or 31 Roadster. the wheels are 19" which you can't really tell but the hubcaps are larger diameter than the 21" wheels of the 28/29 models. Also the bumpers have a single curve compared to the 28/29 which have a double or "recurve" to them. Again I can't see the running board or the radiator shell to be able to tell if it is a 30 or a 31.
