I told the wife I'd like to join but she said, woman-like, if I wanted some exercise I could clear off the south fifty of our lot.

On we rolled over the smooth highway. Some kid in a roadster tried to pass me and he wouldn't have if of those things Julius Caesar or Napoleon or some of those big shots built as monuments to their kingdom. I don't mean they built this one but

As we were breezing along, we heard music. I slowed down to fifty and listened. It was coming from a mammoth radio. The illusion was perfect. We felt like pygmies. It was an exact replica on a large scale of one of the "Super Waffle Grid" Ital-


