President's Message

I was just taking notes in my Tune Up class, and as I'm wont to do, when I got curious about things being said in the lecture, I would look up facts about the Model A related to the subject of the talk.

Model A radiator caps run under 4 lbs of pressure, I've seen a person on YouTube test his engine's intake manifold to 18 inches of mercury vacuum, and oil pressure runs at just 1 or 2 lbs. These old engines have a compression pressure of 65 lbs and originally their standard compression was 4.22 : 1. Although the so-called "police heads" that came out in 1931 raised that to 5.22 : 1, and that became standard with B blocks. Their total horsepower = 40.

Burtz engines usually use regular Brassworks radiators so also have 4 lb radiator caps. They develop about the same vacuum but a whopping 30 lbs of oil pressure. Their compression is up to 135 lbs with a compression ratio of 6.5 : 1. With a Zenith carburetor and original manifold, I've read that their horsepower is not that much higher with all those higher numbers, but they do have higher torque and a better ability to shed heat, which is much better for touring. It seems to



take the addition of a Weber carburetor and new manifold to get the 60 plus horses. (\$890 more dollars) Although, on a test published on Fordbarn I found a person saying he got almost 60 horses from a B engine with the same Weber carburetor and set up.

The more you learn, the more questions that come up. The way of the world is that you don't know what it is you don't know until you learn a little about the subject beyond the hype. I'd have thought that you dropped in the Burtz engine and all your horsepower dreams would come true. You doubled the volts in your cellphone battery, and your call could get through even when someone else is talking. You spent five times as much on a whiskey, and your hangovers would be nearly non-existent, despite getting drunk on a thimble's-full of hooch. Where's the improvement if you don't get those things?

An education is somewhat disappointing because you learn that dreams can't come true so easily. If you are lazy, that alone can kill them. If you're not, education means that dreams are more likely to come true, because you both know what you're doing and can spend your money on all the parts and help needed and not on wishes and wrapping paper which might look good, but won't accomplish anything more than sustaining the fantasy.

I don't want to put down folks happy with that as their final goal; a Model A Ford, shiny and clean, sitting in their garage as a conversation piece. Those cars are great, too, but experience tells me that with those, a car cover and some Johnson's Wax is a better investment than a Burtz block.

May your tank be full and the road opened in front of you.

<u>Tech Report</u> – Mark Greenlee – A variety of lighting options was presented starting with a single battery powered light attached to an elastic headband to a truly blinding multiple LED configuration that plugged into a standard wall outlet and filled the meeting room with light. One innovative solution was to use LED strip lighting similar to movie theater aisle markers. The strip [or ribbon] lights can be purchased quite economically on Amazon. The innovation was Mark used heat shrink tubing to attach small magnets throughout the strip. This allowed exact placement on the vehicle wherever light was needed.

Larry proudly served in the U.S. Navy for 23 years as a data systems analyst, retiring as a Master Chief. He then worked for the government for 12 years as a computer scientist, creating life-saving technology for all of our armed forces.

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ENGINE SPEEDS

I don't yet have my own copy of Chris Halter's book which I'm supposed to be able to purchase at the discounted club price as a member of the SD Chapter, but glancing through it briefly, I believe it also had some torque and pressure values, liquid contents and types of oils and greases suggested for maintenance.

I suggest buying a copy for each of your Model A's and with it, the items to take with you on a long and short tour published in the Annual Club Directory, and the statistics on Model A engines and drive trains mentioned in the president's message and here, you should be able to score well in a game of *Trivial Pursuits—Model A Ford Edition*.

The 30-inch tires of a 1928 Model A make 672.8 complete revolutions per mile and the same number of revolutions per minute when the car is traveling at the 60 mph or a mile-a-minute speed which they can do on the open road.

Since the standard rear-end gear ratio is 3.7 to one, this means that the engine makes 3.7 revolutions for each turn of the rear wheels. Consequently, we have 3.7 times 672.8 revolutions or 2489.36 <u>revolutions per minute of which the engine can</u> actually do on the road.

The Model A Ford engine develops its maximum of 40 actual brake horse power at a speed of **2,400** revolutions per minute. But the maximum speed of the engine is 2,600 revolutions per minute or more according to *Ford Dealer and Service Field* for February, 1928. However, an A engine has no harmonic balancer to prevent the severe 'ringing' shock waves that travel back and forth from front to rear along the crank at very high RPMs.

Burtz engines don't come with harmonic balancers Terry Burtz said "The *New Engine* crankshaft is much stiffer than the original, resulting in smaller torsional deflections. The *New Crankshaft* is also made from a non-resonating material that dampens the small torsional deflections. From an engineering aspect, a harmonic balancer will further reduce the small torsional deflections, but the effect will likely not be noticeable."

Wikipedia says that the engine was an L-head 4cylinder, 'cast en bloc' type. It had a 3-7/8" X 4-1/4" bore and stroke with a displacement of 200.5 cubic inches. SAE horsepower of 24.03 with brake horsepower rated at 40 at **2200** rpm. Typical gas mileage was between 20 and 30 mpg using a Zenith one-barrel carburetor.
