

### The Show Case

### Presenting the New and Novel in Things for the Motor Car (Part 1 of 2)



GOING on the theory that if love makes the world go round it should have some effect on the rolling of the nation's motor cars, our friend who presides over the famous Show Case decided to open up shop one morning recently with the soft melody and exhilarating rhythm of music. From the moment the first prospect stepped over the threshold love songs filled the air to overflowing. It was a loving thought, indeed, and good merchandising as the rest of this story will reveal.

"What's all the melody for?" came the inevitable inquiry from the eternal shop- per who recently swore off on new accessories only to find that he needed about six of them for a fully-equipped car he had just bought. "Can it be that you have at last received my long delayed special delivery epistle warning you that my new car meant a cut in your business? Have you taken the muse by the ears and gone into the melody business?"

"On the contrary," came the quick retort. "I'm putting melody and love to work for automobile row. I'm syncopating sales, jazzing up the jiggers and ragging the rebukes and rebuffs of souls like yourself who think the accessory makers took a perpetual vacation after you purchased last month's offerings. Have a seat!"

It was quite a novelty to be asked to sit down near the Show Case. Somewhat spell- bound the shopper waltzed over to the running board of a small coupe and decided to make himself comfortable. It was then that he discovered he was listening to a radio but his senses were not sharp enough to note that the music was loudest nearest the car. It was still early in the day. And the salesman was slipping into fourth speed.


"I hate to see a beautiful car like yours running around with an inadequately lubricated engine," the gentleman behind the Show Case was saying, already waving in his hand a small device that looked surprisingly like a gasoline filter. "You need top cylinder lubrication to protect the upper walls of the engine, to prevent sticky valves and to spare the motor those first few moments of excess wear following the cranking process. The engine's own oiling system is slow getting into action and even when the oil is flowing freely comparatively little of it reaches the upper walls of the cylinders and the valve stems. That kind of oil wouldn't be right for the job anyway."

"I've seen a thousand of those over-head oilers," the shopper complained. "They're all good and so far as I can see they're all alike. Let me have a look at the one that will cost me the least."




Compelling, yet pleasing to the ear, this master and junior horn combination provides a new way herald one's approach.









This was a frank admission that he really wasn't keeping abreast of the progress of these devices that are playing an increasingly important role in motordom. The salesman seized the opportunity by pointing out the reasons why he had selected the particular oiler for an important "spot" on the new bill of attractions. He continued:

"Here is a device that offers you a special oil for the vital parts of your engine top the moment your foot touches the starter button. The right kind of oil at the right time is an improvement worthy of your most serious thought. Picture your car standing until all the oil has drained down off the cylinder walls. From the moment of the start—in fact, during the cranking itself — this device feeds oil so that while the pistons run up and down in their cylinders they do so freely because they are eased along. There is no scraping, no scuffing. Instead of the dry valve stems pushing up and down in their contracted guides, and perhaps sticking, the oil mist limbers them up and helps your

motor to be itself. Any oiler can supply a mist of oil when the engine is well warmed up; the trick is to oil in time to avoid damage during those vital three minutes which constitute the starting period."

"Please stand by," the radio interrupted to announce. The shopper was commencing to gather the idea that the receiver was inside the automobile but his thoughts were not yet amply lubricated. He decided to follow the salesman through a brief explanation of a unique feature of this new oiler for the motor.

It appears that there is a tube in the shape of a U through which the engine sucks filtered air. Through a small hole near the bottom the ingoing air sucks up a drop or so of the special oil which is carried in a glass bowl surrounding the tube. This oil is carried to a small reservoir near the top and feeds to a wick. The air, in drawing through the wick, picks up the oily mist. Thus it is impossible for the device to feed too much of the oil or to fail to feed if the supply of oil is low.

#### **Modification Safety Features** – Some additional safety features to consider include:





CO2 Alarm ABC Fire Ext

- Fire extinguisher Add accessible dry powder BC or ABC rated fire extinguisher.
- Carbon monoxide alarm (closed cars) A battery operated unit that can be hidden near the floor.
- LED light bulbs Improves brightness of light and reduces amperage demand.





Add-on Brake light

- Additional Brake Lights Available as a period correct rear right fender light and/or a wired or wireless rear window light.
- Carburetor flame arrestor Air Maze or other similar style with "wire mesh" used for backfire protection.





Seat Belts – The most common Model A accident injuries are from a lack of seat belts.



Seatbelt Kit

- Hydraulic Brakes Convert your original brakes to a more modern "Juice" brake.
- Instrument Panel Electrical Insulation
- Install a non-conductive insulation pad between the ammeter / key starter and gas tank.



- Battery Disconnect Switch Install a switch to turn off all the power except for the starter when in storage. Also, a good security feature.
- Brake Floaters Install brake floaters in place of your brake operating wedge. They are designed to equalize shoe contact to your brake drum.




