
I personally felt that Val had singled me out to be in her inner circle of "best friends". It was a special feeling

Jim Cannon's Tech Tips: "Preventing Problems with the Starter Switch Rod"

The Starter Switch Rod passes through the firewall and screws into the Starter Switch. You step on the head of the rod to start the car. You will find that today's reproduction rods screw quite easily into and out of the switch. This can be nice when you are assembling things.

But I have found on more than just a few cars the engine vibration can cause the rod to unscrew itself and back out of the switch. You hit a bump and the rod drops down and makes contact with the post on the starter switch, where

the battery cable connects. Yikes! That's a direct short to ground, with a LOT of amps behind it.

So you want to make the rod a bit harder to turn when installing it in the switch. Add a small drop of blue thread locker to the rod before you screw it in, or gently tap the threads a little with a hammer to deform them and make them harder to screw in and out.

Another simple solution, if you are not doing a car for Fine Point Judging (because it is not how the switch was originally done), is to add a 5/16" nut to the threaded end of the rod before screwing it into the switch. When you have the rod where you want it (desired button height inside the car, etc.) use that nut as a jam nut and lock the rod to the switch. It will not back out while driving, but you can easily undo it when you need to take it apart.

Whichever approach you choose, you will have more trouble-free miles if you get ahead of this potential problem. Until next time... Have a Model A Dav!

FOOL HUB CAPS—Submitted by Cliff Hughes


Here's an interesting factoid for all you newbies. Back in the 1960's and 1970's, there were a lot of replacement parts available from aftermarket vendors. One in particular that I thought was interesting is a series of hub caps that instead of having the "Ford" script on them, they had the word "Fool" or "Food" or sometimes "Bool" on them. There was a popular auto parts company known as "J.C. Whitney (that is now defunct) that sold all sorts of things for vintage cars, and they had a Model A Ford section in their catalog. Their replacement hub caps had these misspelled scripts on them. I pointed a mis-spelled hub cap on a vehicle (Model A) of a friend of mine and he said it was because they were made by companies that did not want to have to pay Ford commission for the use of their name/logo/script, so they would purposely mis-spell Ford's name on the hub cap. At the time, Model A owners who strove for authenticity in their vehicles looked down at these off-market, non-Ford hub caps because they were not original. Now-a-days these hub caps are no longer on the market, but are actually becoming somewhat of a novelty and desired for the mere humor of the back story on them. Whenever I am around large groups of Model As I always keep an eye out for these mis-spelled hub caps on vehicles as they are always a conversation piece at car shows and gatherings.

WOMEN IN AIR RACING

Ever since humans invented motorized flight, they have attempted to race airplanes in the sky. Air racing thrived in the 1920s and 1930s when air travel was a novelty to the American public. Thrilling narratives of the races appeared on the front pages of leading national newspapers and periodicals. The popularity of air racing—which lifted to a high altitude in the early decades of the twentieth century—was grounded by the end of World War II. The popularity of the air races and exhibitions expanded across gender and race lines. In 1906, the first woman flew an aircraft. In 1921, Bessie Coleman became the first African American (man or woman) to earn a pilot's license (she had to travel to France to receive it, as no domestic institute would offer her one).

The First Women's Air Derby was a transcontinental race that began in Santa Monica, California, and culminated in Cleveland, Ohio, for the 1929 Cleveland National Air Races. Amelia Earhart, Pancho Barnes, Louise Thaden, Bobbi Trout and other women aviators of the era brought international attention to women in aviation. That same year, The Ninety-Nines Women's Aviation Organization was born... literally under the wing of an airplane in Cleveland. The organization was founded November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. All 117

women pilots at the time were invited to assemble for mutual support, the advancement of aviation and to create a central office to keep files on women in aviation. In 1931, Amelia Earhart was elected the first President, and the group selected the name "Ninety-Nines" to represent the 99 charter members.

Seventy women held U.S. Department of Commerce licenses in August 1929, but only 40 met the race requirements. Participants had to have 100 hours of solo flight including 25 hours of solo cross-country to points more than 40 miles from the starting airport. The pilot also had to hold a license from



the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale (FAI) and an annual sporting license issued by the contest committee of the National Aeronautics Association (NAA). Each participant also had to carry a gallon of water and a three-day



food supply. Twenty women entered the Derby. The course took eight days to fly and navigate using only dead reckoning and road maps. Undaunted by route changes, sabotage, and death, 14 women completed the Derby with Louise Thaden finishing first.

Prior to the Bendix Trophy Race, air racing officials just would not believe that women were skilled enough to compete against men. Women were encouraged to hold their own competitions. From this came competitions such as the Women's International Free-For-All. Occasionally, women were allowed to compete with the men, such as the National Air Race and Transcontinental Handicap Air Derby, but any accident gave race officials one more excuse to exclude women.
