


The Second Gear Grind

Come on by and get your weekend started in true So. California style.




2024 Membership, Roster and Club Merchandise Items



The NCRG That Wasn't by Weeg Thompson

At the beginning of May, eight Harbor Area members made their way north to Clear Lake for what they thought was NCRG (like CCRG but for Northern California). Turns out we were all wrong, but had a fabulous time at the Lake County A's 27th Annual Spring Opener. Jack and Joan Gordinier, Dennis and Linda Simpson, and Steve and Weeg Thompson drove up on Thursday May 2, and Mirco and Elaine Pisu arrived on Friday, May 3. No one drove or trailered a Model A because rain was predicted for most of the day Saturday. Gordiniers and Simpsons had dinner on Thursday at the Saw Shop Public House in Kelseyville where the food was quite good. They discovered that Kelseyville is a quaint "little" town," but everyone closes up shop early with the exception of Kelseyville Pizza, Saw Shop Public House, and the Scoop (where they enjoyed delicious ice cream after dinner, of course!).

On Friday morning, the early arrivers had a delightful breakfast at Renee's Cafe in Lakeport. Jack and Steve finished off breakfast with milkshakes selected from Renee's list of 15 flavors (one peanut butter and one peach). Both got two thumbs up. After a little shopping and driving around Lakeport during which we came across a number of beautiful murals on various buildings (like we've seen before in Lompoc), we stopped at Lakeport's waterfront Xabatin Community Park which was hosting a National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous People event. The event was held to raise awareness of this problem and of community resources to address this issue and others. A staggering statistic we learned is that over 80% of American Indian and Alaska Native men (81.6%) and women (84.3%) have experienced violence in their lifetime.

The Spring Opener was held at Konocti Harbor Resort and Spa which recently reopened after being closed for about a decade. This was the first event held at the "new" resort. The Opener included a pasta buffet on Friday night, a tour on Saturday with lunch at a local golf course and a drive in the mountains around Clear Lake that provided magnificent views of the lake which is the largest natural lake entirely in California. The Lake County A's adjusted the schedule for the tour so we avoided most of the rain. The Opener was capped of with a banquet on Saturday night with an opportunity drawing that saw six wins at the Harbor Area table. Among the prizes were four bumper seats, two wooden and two upholstered. Steve won three and Elaine won the last one! Elaine also won a waterproof speaker and Joan won a Breakfast Basket. Although the Simpsons were shut out in the opportunity drawing, they "won" the auction that featured a darling Model A pedal car.

It may not have been the NCRG, but we all had a great time, and we hope more members will join us again next year for the Lake County A's Spring Opener!


