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Highlights of the May Tech Seminar

hack for a long time, wandaring what I might find

I had thought about doing this check for a long time, wondering what I might find hidden in my rear brake assembly. With 22 members sharing coffee and donuts, I opened the discussion on why, when, where and what to do about wheel bearing maintenance.

Naturally, the question of, "what grease to use?" came up. I had several samples to show. and even a wheel bearing packing tool provided by one of the members.

Sta-Lube Brake Drum grease is what I have. One container will last a long time! "IF" you can find some, get it!!!....as it is very hard to find!!

We discussed the proper procedure for removing the front bearing, cleaning them, checking bearing AND races conditions to make sure they aren't scarred, or pitted, and as you spin the bearing they don't grind. After cleaning/inspecting, repack with grease (*wear gloves, it's a nasty job!*) and finally the proper adjustment (make sure the tire spins freely.)

Ok, now the big boys! The rear hubs are where surprises may come in! These can be a bit difficult to remove, but we had several examples of rear hub removal tools, including one from Steve Mitchell, the overdrive man, which will accommodate BOTH early and late hubs (several club members own them). We used my car as the Guinea Pig. Surprisingly, the hubs came off relatively easily, thanks to the right puller AND a battery operated impact gun. To my surprise, a loose E-brake connection lever had been rubbing on my drums (this is why you should frequently check rear brakes and bearings), evidenced by the polished heads of the lug studs.

The shoes looked good, so the hub bearings/races were cleaned, inspected, re-greased and then reassembled. *(if you are replacing the bearings, check that they have grooves on the rollers!).* Suggested parts to get <u>before</u> removing the rear hubs: rear hub seals, axle keys and the hub bolt rubber seal. And, oh yeah, the right cotter pins also!

The best suggested time for checking and maintenance the front bearings, is at least once a year, and the rears every 2 to 3 years. If routine maintenance is neglected, it is possible for a major catastrophe to occur while on tour. There were members who had stories of bearings overheating, even to the point of actually welding themselves to the front spindles, which is a <u>HUGE</u> disaster, if on tour. That will almost certainly require replacing the entire front spindle!

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ACCC Update: CALIFORNIA INTRODUCES BILL TO MANDATE SPEED LIMITERS by Dave Knapp

California has introduced SEMA-opposed legislation to require new vehicles to be equipped with speed governors starting in model-year '27. Speed governors, also known as intelligent speed limiters, use GPS technology to limit vehicle speed. If enacted into law, new vehicles would not be able to travel more than 10 mph above the speed limit. While this proposed Bill does not impact our Model A's, clearly our modern iron potentially will have government control and over-watch. Currently, devices that prevent vehicles from exceeding a certain speed are not re-

Currently, devices that prevent vehicles from exceeding a certain speed are not required. Among other issues, this proposal makes broad assumptions about real-world circumstances. This one-size-fits-all approach fails to recognize the diversity of driving ex-

periences and the individual responsibility that automotive enthusiasts take seriously. SEMA has provided the following message you can copy/use if you would like to write to your state representative:

I am writing to express my strong opposition to Senate Bill 961, particularly its provision mandating intelligent speed limiter systems (ISLS) in all new vehicles starting with the 2027 model year. As a passionate automotive enthusiast, I believe this legislation represents a significant overreach of government authority and undermines the very prin-

ciples of personal freedom and trust that are fundamental to the American way of life. SB 961 directly infringes upon the trust and autonomy that automotive enthusiasts hold dear. For many of us, the joy of driving comes from connecting with our vehicles, feeling the power train's response, and experiencing the thrill of responsible control behind the wheel. An ISLS, by its very nature, disrupts this delicate time-honored balance. A driver should not be transformed from a pilot into a passenger, where driving conditions are dictated at all times—instead, those behind the wheel should be empowered to make informed choices based on their skills and judgment. This technology not only diminishes the driving experience but also sends a chilling message: that the government knows bet-

ter than us how to manage our actions, even within the confines of our vehicles. Furthermore, SB 961 makes broad assumptions about real-world circumstances. While speed limits exist to protect motorists, they are not informed by current road conditions or traffic patterns. For example, emergency scenarios may require exceptions to what would normally be deemed reasonable. Ever-changing roads have always demanded a focused yet flexible approach to driving.

I understand the desire to improve road safety, and I wholeheartedly support efforts based on education, enforcement, and infrastructure improvements. However, SB 961 is not the answer. It is a one-size-fits-all approach that fails to recognize the diversity of driving experiences and the individual responsibility that automotive enthusiasts take seriously. It treats us not as responsible citizens, but potential delinquents needing constant monitoring and control.

Respectfully, I urge you to oppose SB 961 and instead focus on solutions that empower drivers, promote responsible behavior, and respect the fundamental right to personal freedom behind the wheel.

Route 66—How Did It Come to Be? By Dianne Gaughen

Back in the good old days (the 1800's), roads were used locally and crosscountry travel was mostly by railroad after the golden spike was driven in 1869, signifying the linking of east and west by train.

But by the 1880's, the invention of the bicycle created a demand for new and better roads. The League of American Wheelmen was organized and lobbied the state legislators for funding for building highways.

But the biggest influence on building more and better highways was the building of the first automobiles in 1893. In 1901, a brave adventurer drove from Kokomo, Indiana to New York City in only six days – a trip of 700 miles. If you do the math, that comes out to about 117 miles a day. Why did it take so long? Because often the roads were dirt or gravel and unmarked.

The American Automobile Association (AAA) was founded on March 4, 1902, in Chicago in response to a lack of roads and highways suitable for automobiles. One of the first tasks the organization advocated for was the building of a cross-country

highway - a formidable task in those days.

At first, roads were surfaced with wooden planks, bricks, gravel or dirt. It wasn't until 1909 that cement concrete was used to pave a public road in Detroit, Michigan. Appropriate, don't you think, since that's where the newly-developed Ford Model T was being built.

But that's a far cry from what would become Route 66.
