President's Message

In December 1972 I spent a weekend with my Aunt Dorislee going to Knotts, buying Christmas presents, and going to Disneyland. My memory is good, but she had Lisa and I visit every year for several years, so I'm only somewhat sure it was that year because of what happened the next summer. Our routine was altered one year by my Uncle Harley volunteering as a Big Brother and his bringing his charge to Disneyland with us. While enjoying the park, Uncle Harley, the boy, and Lisa rode the Matterhorn, and Aunt Dorislee and I did not. I don't remember if I said that I was afraid, if she said that she was afraid, or if I was just being a snot because I was jealous of my Uncle's attention to a stranger and I wanted to disrupt the boy's fun, unsuccessfully. Hard to say 52 years later, but, fast forward six months.

My parents then had me take part in the YMCA Summer Camp in Encinitas, unbeknownst to them I'm sure, for more weeks than most any other camper. Kids came and went, but me and the counselors were in for the long haul. Then on one day, there is a camp outing to Disneyland, and we go



to the Matterhorn, and I know that I am supposed to be afraid of it. Knowing that you are supposed to be afraid of something, allergic to something, and repulsed by something, especially at 8-years-old, is pretty much all that makes up your identity. So I stubbornly refused to ride the Matterhorn, but this time I had a variety of actual counseling about fear from the counselors who'd gotten to really know me that long summer.

I wish I could put a ribbon on this and say that they convinced me to try the ride that day, but I cannot honestly say that I did. However, the talk was influential. I have tried many, many things that have scared me since then, like roller coasters, and have enjoyed riding them ever since. I even got a job as a YMCA summer camp counselor in Encinitas in 1988 and helped kids conquer their fears and try things they'd never done before. I thought I was going to be a really good guy as a counselor, but most of the time, I was just matching up loose socks and stopping water fights in the showers. You not only have to be good at providing counsel, you have to find a kid good at taking your advice.

I bring this up because kids come in lots of ages, especially when you reach your golden years. You might encounter a 50-year-old kid when driving your Model A to a gas station and he lets go with the statement "You must be crazy driving that car on the freeway." Or "My Dad left me one of those when he died. Do you know how I can get rid of it?" They may look fifty, but the self-awareness of what scares and repulses them is straight out of the eight-year-old playbook. You, as the potential mentor to them, should practice in your mind what you will say to them. I can't say that if you say something comforting and wise that they'll become a Model A owner for life, but they might if they are a kid good at taking your advice, and hopefully whatever chances they'll have of trying new things in the future, they'll try them with a little more self-confidence and courage. I imagine all of them afterwards appreciating life's many adventures, and crediting your advice in part for their happy life.

kitchen to show our gratitude.








THE 2024 CAR OLYMPIC GAMES

VAMPIRE ACCESSORIES SUCKING FROM YOUR IGNITION SWITCH


From Using the Model A Ignition Switch to Control Accessories by George E Page of Redmond, Wash. C. 2010

In some cases it is desirable to have the ignition switch control one of more accessories. Electric fuel shut off valves, turn signals, electric fuel pump and electrically actuated overdrive units come to mind.

If you have a pop-out ignition switch it becomes slightly more complicated due to the armored cable, but any switch can be converted with a simple wiring change. Also, if you have a pop out switch, you may want to buy an after market switch for this feature and save a good original pop out switch.

It is to note that the Model A ignition switch is connected in the **middle** of the ignition circuit, between the coil and the points and condenser. Connecting any accessory directly to the switch will result in those accessories to be turned off every time the points close. (This happens many time a minute!) Also the high voltage will be adversely affected because the accessory will be connected directly across the condenser. This means the condenser will perform as though it were partly shorted (leaky). To circumvent this problem, change the wiring, as follows.

- 1. Use an after market ignition switch (part A11576).
- Connect a 12 gauge wire (see "5" below) between the amp meter (yellow and black wire terminal) and one of the terminals on the switch.
- Install a terminal strip (LeBaron-Bonney p/n B-12252) or fuse block (LeBaron-Bonney p/n B-12251-FP) on the fire wall, either in the engine compartment for case of access or under the dash for cosmetic reasons.
- Connect a 12 gauge wire from the other switch terminal to all four of the fuse block circuits (or all of the terminals on the terminal strip. If the terminal strip is being used tie all terminals together.)
- Remove the short wire that connects the coil to the junction box terminal and discard it. (note, you may be able to use this wire for the wire in "2" above.)



- 6. Connect that same coil terminal to one of the fuse outputs on the new fuse block (or one of the terminals on the new terminal strip.)
- 7. Remove the wire connected to the second terminal of the coil (it went from the coil to the ignition switch) and discard it.
- 8. Use a modified armored cable (shorter armored part), or a replacement ignition cable (thinner armored portion) and connect it to this second terminal on the coil.
- 9. Screw the other end of the armored cable into the distributor. (No more than 4 turns.)
- 10. Install a 10 amp fuse in the fuse block in the circuit that goes to the coil. Accessories may now be connected to the other fuse block outputs and they will be on only when the switch is on.

NOTE: This modification circumvents the theft protection provided by the unaltered armored cable. A simple jumper wire connected between the coil and either of the junction box terminals will bypass the ignition switch. (Just don't tell anybody what you have done.)
