


Membership drawing prize [\$30]: Danny Duncan's name was drawn but he was not in attendance. Next month's prize will be \$40.00.





A Dead Battery! by Tom Endy of the Santa Anita A's

A common occurrence: It's not uncommon for a Model A Ford to incur a dead battery, especially those that are still operating on six volts. Model A's are usually not driven daily and prolonged periods of sitting around tend to run the battery down. It is usually discovered when you climb in to go somewhere. You push on the starter button, and nothing.



Modern inconvenience: What a lot of Model A hobbyists may not understand is that we the modern day owners may be contributing to this phenomenon. In a modern car when you switch off the ignition it shuts off all the electrical systems in the car, except maybe for the digital clock. In a Model A Ford when you switch off the ignition, at least the original pop out type, all you are switching off is the power that goes to the ignition points. That may have been fine in Henry's day, but stop and think about what a lot of us have done to the Model A Ford to improve on Henry's design.

The cutout: The cutout used with the generator disconnects the battery from the generator whenever the engine is shut down. Without it the battery would discharge itself through the generator and you would have a dead battery. The cutout has a simple set of contacts that are either open or closed. The problem with the cutout is that the contacts can sometimes become welded shut over a period of time and not open, thus draining the battery when the car is parked. This is highly likely with the poor reproduction cutouts that are on the market. Modern day advancements in electronics provided the world with the diode. The diode is like a switch (sort of) in that it has a high resistance to current in one direction and a low resistance in the other. The low resistance path allows the generator to flow current to the battery to charge it. The high resistance path is supposed to not allow the battery to drain itself through the generator. An abundance of diode mod kits were made available at all the Model A hobby stores. The cutout contacts are replaced with the diode (hopefully in the right polarity) and welded contacts are a thing of the past. However, that high resistance direction is still allowing a small amount of current to flow out of the battery through the generator to ground. The amount of current is minute, in the milliamps, but over time it draws the battery down. Turning the ignition key off does not shut the circuit off. Only removal of the fuse on top of the starter (if one is installed) will open the circuit and prevent the drain.

The alternator: Another modern convenience seen on many Model A's today is the alternator. It is much more efficient than the old fashioned generator. You can buy them in either six volt or twelve volt. In fact you can even buy a six-volt positive ground alternator. However, the alternator has six diodes in it and the high resistance path will eventually drain the battery. This arrangement is also not switched off with the ignition key and it sits there and draws a small amount of current from the battery.

A failed alternator: It is also possible to have an alternator that from all appearances is working fine. You start the car up and the ammeter shows it is charging. However, you can have one or more diodes that are partially shorted. With this situation the current drain from the battery is considerably more and in just a day or so the battery is dead.

Good advice: Whenever you park your car for the night or any other extended period of time. Pull the fuse out of the holder and stand it on its head in one end of the holder. This way everything except the starter switch is disconnected from the battery and there is no chance that a sneaky diode will ultimately cause you to have a dead battery.



Model A Era Camping

My father-in-law used to tell about a camping set up that hooked up to their Model T. During the 1920's, his family often traveled from Victoria, Canada to Southern California. This was the advent of auto camping, with tents that attached to the automobile, and platforms that fit inside the car for sleeping. It was a good idea, one that allowed people to venture far from home in places where there were few overnight accommodations.

Here's an idea of how you could pack your car for Auto Camping. The diagram notes that this method would supply equipment for a party of four. Note how the shovel is strapped to the spare tire, and the tent is strapped to the running board. Don't know how the driver enters the car except thru the window—maybe that's where NASCAR drivers got the idea.



Common methods of auto touring included sleeping inside your auto with special rigging as seen in this early advertisement by <u>Tentobed Company</u>. The TENTOBED is touted as "a tent and bed combined". The ad also says that it can be put up in 5 minutes without any stakes or poles. It does have a framework that holds it up, so I really doubt that 5 minute assembly promise. Another ad for the Tentobed states that it pays for itself in the very first tour - \$30.00 to \$40.00 depending on the style. Also it noted that it is very light, weighing only 37 to 45 pounds, and will ride on the running board of your car, without loss of passenger space!



Another auto camping method was the auto tent and bed kit that was usually carried on the running board. The kit setup like a tent but was attached to the auto using it both for support and additional room. Here is one by the <u>L. F. Schilling Company</u> (below left.) This set up looks a little more primitive, and promises that the "bed positively will not sag to the middle when occupied by two people".





Tent City was touted as a "great advantage to the growth and development of Oceanside."

Check out this 1930 photo (above) from Oceanside's Tent City. You can see some of the coolest tents in the photo are the Tentobed style and are attached to their really cool cars.

Model A Fashions 1928-1931: Hiking & Camping Outfits for Women



Before Patagonia, Columbia, Bean Boots, and Chacos, women had Duxbaks. That's right – Duxbaks were the latest thing in outdoor wear in the 1920s. Prior to 1904, outdoor wear did not really exist. Men wore wool clothes for sports such as hunting and fishing, but this clothing did not have any distinguishing features particularly suited to outdoor activities. By the 1920s, women were wearing riding breeches for horseback riding and lightweight cotton dresses for lawn sports, such as tennis and croquet. When it came to sturdy water-repellant outdoor gear, however, the market was wide-open.

Enter the Utica-Duxbak Corporation. Formed in January 1904 in Utica, NY, gateway to the Adirondacks, the founders of the company observed the growing tide of vacationers traveling to the mountains for camping, fishing, and hiking. They quickly realized that the outdoorsmen and women needed strong durable clothing that could stand up to the demands of wilderness pursuits. The duck cloth, water-repellant clothing they developed quickly became a success. They trademarked the name "Duxbaks" – since water rolled off of it just like a duck's back – and started to advertise in magazines with adventure-oriented readers. The company soon expanded their line to include both men's and women's clothing, as well as lighter garments under the name "Kamp-It".





Another option for female campers was to sew it yourself. Check out these Butterick Patterns: Pattern # 4552 (drawing on the right): Middy Blouse and Knickers. "The Middy blouse holds its own as a becoming and practical half of the knicker-and-blouse hiking costume. The middy blouse and separate knickers are suitable for general sportswear. Make them of khaki, cotton poplin, or serge; or make the blouse of white jean or pongee with knickers of khaki, tweed, serge or corduroy.... The middy blouse and knickers are correct for girls and misses 6 to 18 years."

Pattern # 4157 (drawing on the left): "For the open roads and hidden trails young hikers wear a white jean middy and plaited or gathered bloomers of navy blue



serge or khaki. Or make the entire garment of khaki, serge, or cotton poplin. This is good...for the gymnasium or for general sportswear. The blouse may be made with a yoke and the collar may be detachable.... The middy blouse and bloomers are for juniors and girls 6 to 16 years."

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
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
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
