This must have sparked interest, because this seminar had an outstanding attendance for a warm Saturday morning. I was especially glad to see some of our lady members also attended. Tissy Hatcher and her daughter, Jody Smith (who is currently taking automotive classes), and also Joni Terens, who is the primary operator of "The Purple Penguin", one of our club's more iconic vehicles.

I had met with Greg Masterson several weeks earlier and set this presentation up, thinking this would be of interest to the club members. Greg presented about a one hour long video presentation on what it takes to maintain the interior and exterior of our cars and how it also relates to our modern vehicles.

Masterson's Car Care produces a full line of products for every aspect of car care. Greg recommended five of their products that he thought would be specifically right for our cars: Waterless Wash and Wax, Legend Carnauba Wax,

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Club Members To The Rescue... By Steve Pavich

Recently, my son Matt purchased a 1929 Model A Truck from a former OCMAFC member. The truck had been parked in a garage for several years, and as expected, it had a dead battery, flat tires and a rusty gas tank. Otherwise the vehicle seemed to be in good condition. The truck was transported by trailer to it's new home in Fountain Valley, where the process began of removing substantial amounts of rust and debris from the gas tank.

Club members, including Rick Hall, Dennis Kliesen, Richard Parrish, Don Ratzlaff, Bruce MacIntosh and Eric Engle, provided suggestions on how to clean the tank. After a dozen attempts using household cleaning products, including liquid degreaser, boiling hot soapy water and diluted muriatic pool acid, the tank was better, but still not rust-free. The gas tank will be removed, professionally cleaned and coated to provide many years of rust-free service. A new tank filter (pencil filter) will be also installed.

Club members Eric Engle, Bruce MacIntosh and William Smith once again came to the rescue when problems occurred while attempting to start the engine. Before cranking the engine, the spark plugs were removed and a half shot glass of Marvel Mystery Oil was poured into each cylinder and left to soak for several days. This procedure helps free the piston rings after the engine has not been run for years. The carburetor was cleaned and the points, condenser and coil were checked and found to be in good condition.

"Gentleman, Start your engine"... but that didn't happen. William Smith, with his extensive wealth of knowledge of Model A's, suggested removing the chrome gauge cover from the dashboard and tightening the nuts on the back of the ammeter and ignition switch. That solved the problem! The engine came to life after sitting idle for years. William Smith explained that electrical resistance caused by loose connections sometimes becomes a problem, when the starter draws a large amount of power away from the coil and distributor, thus preventing the engine from starting. This is especially true when the electrical system is six volts.

The '29 Model A truck will soon be on the road again thanks to several club members who were given a penny for their thoughts and gave back their two cents worth. Now the question is, what happened to the other penny?

TO CLAY, OR NOT TO CLAY.... THAT IS THE QUESTION! By Eric Engle

Recently our club visited Masterson's Car Care In Anaheim, Ca., for a demonstration on how to take the best care of one's vehicles, inside and out. This Editor bought, along with several other products, a BIG bar of clay, for removing airborne contaminates that always settle, and stick, to all the top surfaces of a vehicle. After thoroughly washing and drying my coupe, I decided to try out my clay bar. With a bit of Detailing spray, I proceeded to do all the top surfaces and thought it rather interesting how much grime the clay bar actually pulled off. Though my car is well taken care of, and was washed just prior to using the clay bar on it, you can see the difference between the "before" and "after" use of the clay bar . It's rather amazing just how much hidden grime can be on the top surfaces of the cleanest of vehicles! And it's even more amazing how smooth the paint feels after washing, claying, and then waxing.

Chrisanne Edmonson – US Air Force 1980-2004

BIG DRAGS & OFF TO SEE THE WORLD



It was a 3:00am morning, on 7th of May 1980, when I left for Air Force Basic Training, at Lackland AFB, Texas. When I enlisted in the Air Force, I chose my career field in AF Accounting & Finance/Travel. After graduating from basic training, I was bussed to Sheppard AFB in Wichita Falls, Texas for tech school. The experience of marching in flight to class at 6am, carrying our flashlights – it looked like "fireflies". Other Squadrons were also marching from their dorms to class, with flashlights: a sea of "fireflies". Our platoon marched under the wing of a B-52 (aka BUFF). Wingspan of that plane is 185 feet. In the last week of Tech School, assignments were handed out for duty stations after graduation: mine was in Texas; again. Bergstrom AFB in Austin, Texas.

The Air Force and Air Force Reserve became a large part of my life for 24 years; drilling and training once a month and annual tours all over the world.

I liked Bergstrom AFB! My dorm to the Accounting and Finance office was catty corner across the street, and the Exchange, Commissary, and movie theatre were directly across the street. When I reported, I was told I was chosen to process incoming personnel at CBPO (Consolidated Base Personnel Office). I would go to CBPO with a member from military "Pay Division" three mornings a week. My briefing was to members on how to complete their travel voucher for PCS (Permanent Change of Station) moves.

Later, I would submit paperwork for "Palace Chase" (an administrative process transferring "Active" duty personnel to "Reserve" duty) and was approved. I later went to McChord AFB into to a new career field as a "Transportation Specialist". My new unit was the 52nd Aerial Port Squadron. To describe an 'Aerial Port', it is the activity shown on TV when the news covers military deployments. Air Force planes usually shown (C-141 and C-5), with back doors open, usually being loaded with heavy equipment: K-Loaders (thousand lb loaders, with pallets), rolling stock, forklifts, and all-terrain forklifts. Aerial Ports also process PAX (passengers), Special Handling of hazardous cargo, or special cargo (canines, band equipment, etc.). The Cargo section builds pallets, "Ramp Services" sets up pallet loads and Rolling Stock, outsized cargo, etc., to be loaded or offloaded aircraft.

Bases where I was stationed: Lackland AFB, TX; Sheppard AFB, Wichita Falls, TX; McChord AFB, Tacoma, WA; Norton AFB, San Bernardino, CA; March ARB (Air Reserve Base), Moreno Valley, CA; Langley AFB, Hampton, VA; Charleston AFB, SC; Pope AFB, NC. Annual tours: Yokota AB, Japan; Elmendorf AFB, Alaska; Osan AB, Korea; Ramstein, Germany; Hickam AFB, Hawaii; NAS Oceana, Virginia Beach, VA; Dover AFB, Delaware (the largest air freight terminal in the AF). I have worked in most every section. I worked our ATOC (Air Terminal Operations Center), and was a Load Planner (for aircraft loads for C-141's, C-130's, & C-5's). At Dover AFB there were C-5's. I worked in Fleet Services for the first time in 2001. There was a tarmac of C-5's which I inventoried on the last day of my annual tour; I loved that! I drove the truck clear to the end and worked my way back to the fleet building.

Other squadron positions I worked at: Safety "NCO" (Non-Commission Officer), Aerial Port Office
Manager (McChord AFB), NCOIC (Non-Commissioned Officer In Charge) of Awards & Decorations; and
NCOIC of SE/QC (Self-Evaluation/Quality Control). I completed Power Point presentations for Commander's
Out-Brief every UTA (Unit Training Assembly) at March "ARB" (Air Reserve Base). I also wrote a special program for my squadron at March "ARB" to "In-Process" personnel quickly into squadron. That greatly reduced training time. My decorations: Commendation Medal with Device, Achievement Medal, Letters of Appreciation. A very special recognition was from the Staff Assistance Team that inspected Accounting & Finance at Bergstrom and viewed our "CBPO" in-processing. They said it was the best program they had ever seen in the Air Force. I retired as an E-6, Technical Sergeant.

Yes, I did all this, and PCS'd (Permanent Change of Station) about every 3 years.

Route 66 – Who is Cyrus Avery? by Diane Gaughen

~ Continuation of our series about the beginnings of Route 66 ~

If there is any one person who can be credited with getting Route 66 on the map, that person is Cyrus Avery. But who was he and how did he come to have such a great influence on creating the Mother Road?

Avery was a native of Pennsylvania, moved to Indian Territory (what would become Oklahoma) at 14, attended college, taught school, became an insurance

representative and started an oil company.

When Oklahoma became the 46th state, he moved to Tulsa where pigs ran loose in the streets. He started a farm loan agency and became well-versed in oil, farmland and real estate. He was elected county commissioner and supported the building and maintenance of roads, even becoming a director of the Tulsa Automobile Club.

He worked with the Ozark Trails Association which worked to maintain and mark a highway from Springfield, Missouri through Tulsa to Amarillo, Texas. He was eventually elected president of the Associated Highways Associations of America in 1921. And then in 1924, he became a leader of the American Association of State Highway Officials, which petitioned the US government to begin "the selection and designation of a comprehensive system of through interstate routes"

And now you know why Route 66 was routed through Tulsa, Oklahoma!

QUICK AND EASY HEADLIGHT ADJUSTMENT METHOD

What's needed:

- one straight 2" X 4" X 4 ft.
- Carpenter's level
- Level spot to park the Model A

This method is strictly mechanical; no aiming the lights at a wall.

- Loosen the nuts holding the headlights to the light bar.
- Lay the 2 x 4 across the faces
 of both headlights. Adjust
 them so that they both lie flat
 against the 2 x 4, ensuring that
 they will both be pointed
 straight ahead and parallel to
 each other. This is assuming
 that your fenders align
 properly and nothing is bent
 out of shape.
- Lay the level vertically against each headlight face and adjust them both so that they are cocked forward ½ bubble on the level. Tighten the nuts.
- Check the 2 x 4 and level to make sure nothing has moved. If it has moved, loosen the nuts and repeat the procedure until it all checks out with the nuts tight.
