




### **TOURS & ACTIVITIES**

### MODEL A CRAZY!



In the summers of the 60s, eight of my cousins and I learned to drive, not all at the same time, in my Uncle Gordon's 1929 Model A flatback pickup. None of us were of age, but we didn't need to be, on the dirt roads around Uncle Gordon's cabin on Incline Lake, above Lake Tahoe.

That pickup got deep into our blood, and my cousin Mike, the oldest, bought another Model A pickup as his first car. Then, my cousin Stephen bought a '29 Standard Tudor sedan when he turned sixteen. That hooked me, and I got an unassembled '30 Standard Tudor when I was fifteen, and then my cousin John bought a '31 Tudor. Scott McNatt moved in next door to my cousins at age ten, and the fumes got him too; when he was sixteen, he got a '31 Model A coupe. Then, our friend Rand bought a '30 coupe after Scott! But before all that, I met Todd Tanzi in homeroom at Portola Junior High in Tarzana when we were eleven. I was reading a Model A repair book. I had no car, but I had the book! Todd walked over and told me his dad had a Model A coupe. I walked home with Todd to see the car that afternoon, and that was the beginning of our lifelong friendship. Todd converted that coupe into the '31 roadster now owned by his nephew and San Fernando Valley Model A Club member, Russell Buelna.

Uncle Gordon bought a '28 phaeton, and Uncle Jack bought a '30 Deluxe Fordor. Did I mention we were all crazy for Model A's? My cousin, Stephen MacLean, and Todd both worked with Hank Sorney restoring Model A's, and Stephen later started the Model A Clinic in Chatsworth.

Stephen, John, Scott, Russell, and I still have our Model A's and a lifetime of friendships to go with them. And all of us are still members of the Model A Club. The picture above is from our trip in 1976, driving over the Continental Divide at Independence Pass in Colorado, at 12,095 feet. From left to right is me with my '30 Tudor, Armand D'Allo, Hawley MacLean and Scott McNatt with Scott's '31 coupe, Jerry Brockelsbee, Stephen MacLean with his '29 Tudor, Gordon MacLean with his '28 phaeton, and John Hastings with his '31 Tudor.

1968: The precursor of things to come. We drove to Colorado, with Uncle
Gordon's '13 Model T in tow, and he drove it through the Rockies each day we were there.
1972: We drove to the Grand Canyon in five Model A's, including Dick Messick's '29 flatback pickup.
1974: We drove to the World's Fair in Spokane and onto Calgary, across to Vancouver, and back home to the Valley.
1976: Monument Valley, the Grand Canyon, and over the Continental Divide.
1977: Yellowstone and Sun Valley, Idaho.

We had wrecks and breakdowns galore all along the way, including purchasing an engine and rebuilding it in a hotel room in Aspen. The management must have loved that.

The love and friendship and adventure all came about because of our camaraderie and love for Model A's.


