

Henry Ford's Legacy: A Century of Reflection

Henry Ford, the legendary industrialist who revolutionized American manufacturing, had strong views on immigration, education, economic stability, and war—thoughts that remain strikingly relevant in today's political landscape. As we navigate the presidential elections of 2024, it's compelling to reflect on how Ford's century-old concerns echo in our current debates.



For many women in the early 20th century, Henry Ford's affordable automobile represented freedom and financial security, especially if they were fortunate to be part of the Ford Motor Company family. Often their expressions of thanks were homemade and in this case also politically inspired. Although Henry Ford never admitted to any presidential aspirations, many Americans wanted to see him in the White House.





Ford's Views on Immigration and Cultural Preservation

Ford believed America had a unique ability to manifest ideas inherited from Europe, rooted in Roman and Greek civilization. However, he worried that mass immigration might disrupt this cultural evolution, arguing that some immigrants arrived with deeply ingrained beliefs that could clash with American values. He feared that these foreign influences, particularly from groups struggling to assimilate, might threaten America's cultural progress.


The 1965 Hart-Celler Act, which abolished national origins quotas favoring European immigrants, marked a turning point in America's immigration landscape. While celebrated for promoting anti-discrimination, it also raised concerns about cultural cohesion in an increasingly diverse nation. Today, with immigrants from Latin America, Asia, Africa, and the Middle East shaping American life, the U.S. is more multicultural than ever.

Many see this diversity as a strength, enriching the national tapestry with enrichments like Mexican cuisine and African American contributions to music. But others—echoing Ford—worry about the erosion of shared culture. Much like the discontented masses in ancient Rome, who became dependent on their government for sustenance and entertainment, there are concerns that a divided population might lose sight of common values, making it more vulnerable to instability.

HENRY FORD'S LEGACY: A CENTURY OF REFLECTION

Ford's Vision for Education

Ford's concerns about unchecked migrations naturally extended into his views on education. He envisioned an education system that transcended mere knowledge transmission; it should shape character and foster a shared sense of community. In 1916, Ford founded the Henry Ford Trade School, aiming to equip young men with practical skills and a solid academic foundation. His vision was to cultivate a skilled workforce capable of supporting American industry from within, rather than relying on external labor forces.









Ford's commitment to education didn't stop there. In 1925, he established a School of Nursing for women at Henry Ford Hospital, offering tuition-free training that not only developed technical skills but also instilled a sense of responsibility and character. The six-story Clara Ford Nurses Home provided housing for 300 students, ensuring they received hands-on training in a supportive environment. For Ford, education was not merely about preparing for a career; it was about nurturing capable and responsible citizens.

Today's education system often prioritizes test scores and college admissions over holistic development. With modern debates focusing on failing schools, we must ask ourselves: Have we lost sight of the purpose of education?

Ford's Economic & World Peace Plan

Ford's vision for economic stability included a radical proposal to end wars. He aimed to buy the nitrate plants and the power generated from the Wilson Dam in Muscle Shoals, Alabama to ensure that "the American people will never again consent to the issuance of an interest-bearing bond for an internal improvement." Instead of relying on loans, Ford suggested the government could issue money backed by the country's natural wealth and resources.



His ambitious plan for the world's largest power plant on the Tennessee River sought to replace gold with an "energy currency," backing money with units of energy rather than precious metals. This shift would render wars over financial power obsolete.

Although Congress rejected his purchase proposal, Ford's concerns about our economic system remain relevant today. Since the U.S. abandoned the gold standard in 1971, the dollar has become fiat currency; the value relying solely on public trust in the government. This shift prompts deeper questions about the stability of our economic system: Is an economy built on trust alone sustainable in the long term, or are we risking future financial instability?



Ford's Legacy in 2024: A Century of Reflection

During Ford's lifetime, there was a widespread sense of optimism as Americans united to build the "World of Tomorrow." Americans built machinery, innovative architecture, and technological advancements that enhanced lives across the nation. The achievements of Ford's era reflected boundless possibilities and a journey toward a more advanced civilization. Yet, a century later, we find ourselves still grappling with many of the same challenges he sought to address.

As we approach the 2024 elections, these longstanding debates—over immigration, education, economic policy and a plan for World peace—remain among the most divisive issues we face. At this pivotal moment, the 2024 presidential election compels us to reflect deeply on our past and our present. Today's choices will not only define our future but also the legacy by which we will be remembered by future generations.

I will always remember the adventures I had with Phil from trips to swap meets together and moving a fully assembled Bend Pack Lift to our house in Lake Arrowhead. Plus he would often stop by to show me his latest treasure he was dragging home. Rest in peace my friend.


Model A Youth Restoration Awards
