

Let me start by asking you if the black business coupe on the cover of the most recent Model "A" News looks familiar to you? I'm sure some of you recognize it although it belongs to a man in Indiana. The magazine not only put it on the cover, but there is a very nice article by the owner and probably a hundred pictures of the car with close ups to show the magnificent details of the restoration. The car was taken to MARC's National Meet in Asheville, North Carolina where it won The Henry Award and MARC of Excellence Award 497 points. I have read through the article several times and I'm going to quote to you from it. "It took years to acquire the type and quality parts needed for a correct restoration. The restoration project ex-

tended so long that my top and upholstery folks retired, the auto body and paint shop went out of business, the pin stripe guy moved to Florida and my radiator man passed and the shop closed. Our own club member Mark Williamson, of Singing Hills Restorations, received delivery of this car in pieces, boxes and on pal-



lets about two years ago. For those of you who didn't know, Mark is a neighbor of mine, he lives only a few doors away. I was able to witness the car's complete restoration on my many trips to Mark's house. I'm frequently there to pick his brain or borrow his Model "A" specific tools for some project of my own. There are two photos attached to this article, before and after. Mark took that car from the ground up and made it a winner. He did body work, painting in his own paint booth, assembly and even did the upholstery right there in his shop. But nowhere in the magazine did it mention Mark Williamson or give him any credit. That omission bothered me and I asked Mark if he was OK with it. Being the soft spoken, mild mannered person he is, Mark said it was no problem. I feel that credit should go where credit is due. 






Marginal Spark Plugs by Ed Taylor



Types: 3X, C-4, W-14Y, W-16Y, and TT-10 all work in the Model "A" and fit the 7/8-18 threads in the spark plug holes. These are all non-resistance plugs. When they started to install radios in cars they added a series resistor in the spark-plug to stop ignition noise in

the radio. With an ohm-meter on the lowest range measure the path from the top to the center electrode. The resistance should be zero, or in other words, a complete path. Any resistance measured means there is a poor connection internal to the plug. You should read infinity measuring between the elec-

trodes, or in other words open. Spark-plugs that read other than these readings do work, but they are marginal. I have found brand new spark-plugs right out of the box that were marginal. Test them before installing. When you do not get the correct readings with an ignition-coil polarity tester, no matter how the coil is wired, that coil is marginal, and it is going to fail.

Let's Talk Turkey!

Ah, the glory of Thanksgiving and turkey farming in the past. Norman Rockwell painted the picture that memorializes in our minds what the holidays of yesteryear were really like. All the family was together. Everyone was happy. Every family had a perfect, oversized turkey on the table. Life was never easier or grander. Or was it? Just what was the actual cost to get that Thanksgiving turkey onto the table in the Model A Era? When you adjust the cost of inflation, you start to realize that a turkey for the holidays was something special. The minimum wage in 1928 was 45 cents per hour. Thanksgiving turkeys were about 55 cents per pound. That means that the 20-pound bird in the painting cost that family today's inflationary equivalent of over \$100.

The turkey, *Meleagris gallopava*, and its modern descendants have ancestral roots in Mexico and the Eastern two-thirds of the United States. Explorers began to take them back to Europe in the 1500s to meet the demands of royalty for this exotic new bird. There they were raised on the large estates of European royalty and aristocracy.

By the early 1700s, domesticated turkeys were a common sight in some areas of England. By 1720, some 250,000 turkeys had been collectively herded from Norfolk, England, to the markets in London, an approximate distance of 118 miles. The birds were driven in flocks of 300 and 1,000 birds. The turkeys' feet were dipped in tar or wrapped in little leather booties to protect them. The birds were fed in the stubble fields while en route.

Historical sources make it pretty clear that domesticated turkeys were still considered partially wild well into the early 1900s, and were raised as such.

By 1918, production attitudes were gradually changing, at least on the West Coast. Turkeys were still open-ranged and considered partially wild, yet artificial incubation was becoming the norm. "Turkey farming, as it is called, is mainly in the grain districts where the fowls can range. Hatching by incubators prevails generally" — 1918 Statistical Report of the California State Board of Agriculture.

About the same time, a young farmer in Virginia, Charles Wampler, began wondering if turkeys could be raised in captivity in entirely enclosed systems. In speaking with Charles' great-grandson, Harry Jarret. Harry stated that during the years 1920 and 1921, his great-grandfather wrote to about 100 county extension agents all over the United States, and all but one told him that turkeys were wild animals and could not be successfully raised in captivity. Despite the negative answers, he decided to give it a try. He built an artificial incubator, and in 1922, hatched his first brood.

That initial small experiment eventually grew into a large domesticated turkey raising industry that expanded throughout the Shenandoah Valley. Charles Wampler became known as the father of the modern turkey industry in the United States and has been honored with a permanent spot in Virginia Tech's Poultry Hall of Fame.

In the 1930s through the 1950s, turkeys were routinely butchered at about 28 weeks of age, although they were sometimes held longer if consumer demand dictated a fatter bird. It was nothing for the birds to consume 80 or 90 pounds (or more) of grain and feed concentrates if they did not have lots of pasture or forage available.

Today's commercial turkeys reach marketable weights on much less feed, within a much shorter period of 16 weeks. According to the Minnesota Turkey Growers' Association, turkeys today produce twice as much meat on half the feed as birds did in 1930. Penn State University lists feed consumption today for a 16-week-old marketable



bird at about 46 pounds for hens and 64 pounds for toms, a huge reduction from feed consumption years ago.

When we look at commercially-raised turkeys today and see how dependent they are on human care and protection, it is almost inconceivable that birds just 100 years ago were considered highly efficient at self-care and self-perpetuation. What's In a Name?

A 1928 Tudor Named "Bumblebee" Tina Weisenseel's Model A Story



Tina Weisenseel provided these quotes from her father, Richard Mutigli, the fourth owner of her 1928 Tudor:

"I bought the 28 Model A in 1957 from a friend who needed \$75 to finish linoleum flooring in his kitchen. The car was blue with black fenders and had 16 inch wheels from a 34 Ford. I put a trailer hitch on it and pulled a homemade trailer many times for sand and gravel jobs. My wife Katie learned to drive it and used to take our kids and neighborhood kids to school. It was never in an accident and was always dependable. Later I decided to put 21" wheels back on and have it painted. I wanted the old car to be noticed so I had it painted yellow. Although it was not pristine, it looked good in parades. Now my wife and I are relieved to know it is in good hands and around good people.

P.S....now if I were 85 instead of 95, I would be looking for a deal!"

Tina tells us that when it arrived home from the paint shop painted yellow with black stripes and black fenders, her family named it "Bumblebee".

"Christmas Tree Selection"

From the book, <u>Advertising the Model A Ford</u>, we snipped the artwork and information from the advertisement titled "Christmas Tree Selection".

"During their visit to the farm, this family has selected and cut their Christmas Tree, Dad, ax still in in his hand, mops his brow. 
