OCMAFC Military Veterans

Darwin Kibby - Lieutenant Colonel (Ret) - USAF (1988-2008)

2nd Lt Darwin Kibby entered the Air Force from ROTC at Oregon State Univ in July 1988 and began his career as an ICBM Missile Launch Officer (91st Missile Wing, 742 Missile Squadron, Minot AFB, ND). He served 4-1/2 years in this field starting as a Deputy Missile Combat Crew Commander and progressing multiple steps to ICBM Missile Codes Controller.

Capt Kibby was competitively selected to be the Operations Officer for ICBM Operational Test Launch Team. In Nov 1992, he was the commander of the primary launch crew leading the operational test launch of a Minuteman III ICBM from Vandenberg AFB, CA. In 1993, after completing his missile tour assignment, Capt Kibby was selected to attend the Air Force Institute of Technology (AFIT), Educationwith-Industry (EWI) program. He was assigned as a Contracting Student to Lockheed Missiles & Space Company in Sunnyvale, CA. Upon completion, he attended Squadron Officer School at Maxwell AFB, AL.

In 1994, Capt Kibby reported to his first assignment as a Contracting Officer to the Sacramento Air Logistics Center, McClellan AFB, CA. He worked in several assignments including the Ground Theater Air Control System, the A10/F-111 Aircraft programs and the Operational Contracting Services Flight. In 1997, Capt Kibby was assigned to the HQ Air Force Space Command (HQ AFSPC) Contracting Flight, in Colorado Springs, CO. He worked MAICOM-level contract efforts including the commandwide, HQ AFSPC Energy Savings Performance Contract, AFSPC Library Services Contract, and the HQ AFSPC Human Resources A-76 Competition.

In 2000, Maj Kibby accepted an assignment to the Air Expeditionary Forces Battlelab, Mountain Home AFB, ID. He was a contracting advisor to the commander managing a \$4.5M annual budget for Battlelab Initiatives designed to explore ways to make Air Force deployments more efficient, cost effective, and have a greater impact on adversaries. (Light, Lean, Lethal).

In, 2002, Maj Kibby was assigned to the Space & Missile Center, Los Angeles AFB, CA. Here he worked for the Engineering Analysis Design & Development Contract, providing \$450M of engineering and technical support across most of the center's space programs.

In July of 2003, Maj Kibby deployed to Baghdad, Iraq to support Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF). He supported the Coalition Provisional Authority efforts to rebuild critical infrastructure and establish a democratically elected Iraqi Government. He forward deployed to Basrah Iraq to support OIF operations working with British. Canadian & Danish Coalition Forces.

After completing his deployment in Jan 2004, Lt Col Kibby returned to Los Angeles AFB to be the Deputy Chief of Contracting in the Space Based Infrared Systems (SBIRS) program office. Lt Col Kibby worked with the Defense Support Program office to prepare for the launch of the DSP-23 Missile Warning Satellite. Lt Col Kibby worked the Space Based Infrared System Low (SBIRS Low) program to develop and build a low earth orbit missile detection/missile warning capability.

In Sep of 2006, Lt Col Kibby deployed to Kandahar, Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. Here he led a contracting team to support regional operations with multinational coalition

and NATO forces to combat Taliban insurgents.

Lt Col Kibby returned to the Space Based Infrared Systems Program at LA AFB in Feb 2007. He continued working with the SBIRS portfolio of missile warning systems. After 20 years of honorable service, Lt Col Kibby retired in July of 2008.

New California Driving Laws Take Effect in 2025

A few new laws take effect in California on January 1, 2025. Here's what's changing for California drivers in the new year.

Stay Away From Crosswalks

Assembly Bill 413, more commonly known as a "Daylighting Law," takes effect across California in 2025. This bans drivers from parking within 20 feet of a crosswalk to make intersections safer for pedestrians.

The law applies whether the crosswalk is marked or unmarked and regardless of if the curb is painted red. California cities have been working to put up signage and paint curbs to make it easier for drivers to navigate the new normal, but they acknowledge not all curbs will be painted red in time. If you're parking facing a crosswalk, look for the red curb first. If it's there, respect that distance. If there's no red paint, leave a space of 20 feet (or a bit longer than a large SUV) between your parked car and the intersection.

Locked Door Loophole

Senate Bill 905 eliminates a loophole in California criminal code, which defined burglary to include "entering a vehicle when the doors are locked with the intent to commit grand or petit larceny or a felony."

Under prior law, the victim would physically be required to go to court and testify that the vehicle was locked. Now, car owners and prosecutors won't have to prove a car was locked, just prove that "forcible entry" occurred.

Increased Minimum Insurance Coverage in an Accident

Senate Bill 1107 increases minimum insurance liability limits for when someone is hurt or killed in a crash, or if they suffer property damage. The limits currently in effect are woefully inadequate given the cost of medical care and collision repair, even so, the new coverage minimums are a step in the right direction, but still fall short of what actual costs may be should an accident occur. Starting in January 2025, the required liability limits double:

Coverage	<u>Before</u> 2025	Starting 2025
Per person for bodily injury or death	\$15,000	\$30,000
Per accident for bodily injury or death	\$30,000	\$60,000
Property damage	\$5,000	\$15,000

Happy New Year from Carl & Ellie Pease in Aiken, South Carolina. "Our favorite spot for lunch with lots of history!" This is Carl & Ellie at the Historic Willcox Hotel in Aiken. The hotel operated from 1898 to 1957 by members of the Willcox family. Only Aiken famous resort hostelries still standing. It was sold at auction in 1957 and was renovated and reopened in 1985.



Ron's Mini-Tech Tip Checking a battery <u>Cutout switch</u>.

- 1 Disconnect the output wires from the Cutout Switch.
- 2. Using an ohmmeter, measure the resistance from the output terminal to the case.

Passed - the output terminal should read open.

The output contacts are NOT grounded to the case.

Failed - the output terminal reads short to the base.

Repair or replace Cutout Switch.

- 3. Using an ohmmeter, with switch in the "OFF" position, measure the resistance between the Cutout Switch input and the output terminals.
- Passed the resistance between the input and the output terminals should be open.
- <u>Failed</u> a short circuit reading indicates the switchs contacts are shorted together CORRECTIVE ACTION.

Install a NEW Cutout Switch to prevent the battery from discharging through the generator.

The Continuing History of Route 66 So How Was Your Trip?

Now that our highway had a number, what was it like to drive on it? Well, it was easy to get lost! As one old-timer whose father had owned a gas station in the 1920's put it, "The roads were no good, tires were no good, cars would get hot, and the highways were not marked."

Cyrus Avery's joint board adopted the black-and-white shield to mark national highways. That was helpful, but it didn't mean the roads would be paved! It wasn't until the early 1920's that Illinois state highway engineers put down a test patch of concrete cement outside the State Fair Grounds north of Springfield. In the years that followed, more concrete pavement linked Chicago to Springfield and on to St Louis.

All sorts of things were used as pavement – not just concrete. Some roads were sand or wooden planks. But progress was being made. In 1929 a Texaco road report indicated that Illinois and Kansas were fully paved with concrete, Missouri was 2/3 paved, and that Oklahoma was 1/4 paved. Texas had no pavement yet and on the 1221 miles of route 66 that covered New Mexico, Arizona and California, only 64 miles of pavement had been poured.

It was 1938 before Route 66 was paved all the way to Santa Monica, California. In the meantime, drivers had to have a spirit of adventure, a sense of humor and a working knowledge of auto mechanics in order to undertake a cross-country trip in the 1920's.


